# Co-Chomunn na Pairc AGM Scheduled for 7:30pm Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> September, Ravenspoint



Dear reader,

The following is offered as a brief history of Co-Chomunn na Pairc, hopefully to demonstrate the impact it has had on the community and economy of South Lochs and to demonstrate what the business is capable of going forwards. We regard the Co-Chomunn (and Ravenspoint) as important fixtures in the district, and we'd like to encourage all members of our community to attend our AGM at Ravenspoint on **Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> September at 7:30pm**. We are especially keen for new volunteer Directors to come forward and join us, and if any of you have ideas on how CCnP & Ravenspoint can be developed in future we heavily encourage you to bring your thoughts and plans to the table.

As many of you know, Co-Chomunn na Pairc was established as a community co-operative in the late 1970s under the auspices of the Highlands & Islands Development Board, now Highlands & Islands Enterprise, and in fact is one of the few of these co-operatives to remain operational. In its original form, the Co-Chomunn explored various avenues of operation, primarily operating as a supplier of agricultural goods but also expanding to include the making and selling of knitwear and the operation of a salmon hatchery. The company began to coalesce into the Co-Chomunn na Pairc we know today in the early 2000s when it was established as a limited company and, very importantly, as a charitable body acting for community benefit. 2009 saw a major development with the establishment of a subsidiary arm, Ravenspoint Trading Ltd., to run the Ravenspoint community shop, and shortly afterwards the addition of an extension to the rear of the building where the cafe now sits. The fuel pump was installed in 2013.

Moving on to the present, today Ravenspoint acts as a community hub for South Lochs, offering a shop & Post Office services (including an outlet for local artists and crafters), 24 hour fuel, a hostel for visitors, home baking & hot drinks, a museum, and a gathering point for the local community. It's safe to say that the original founders of Co-Chomunn na Pairc didn't foresee the place developing as such, but the passing of time demands changes be made and the Board of

Directors have tried to adapt the business to the changing needs of the community of South Lochs. The Co-Chomunn, and Ravenspoint, have had to learn from both good and bad experiences. The primary lesson from the former is that the community of South Lochs are incredibly generous with their time and skills, without the constant effort and support of volunteers from the local community both entities quite simply couldn't do what they do. From the latter, there is still much to learn: a combination of serious financial difficulty in recent years and the untimely loss in 2024 of Ishbel Maclennan, who among her many other roles in Pairc was also one of the the longest serving and most experienced Directors on the Board, has forced changes to the operation of the shop and cafe that could not be avoided. Despite these difficulties, as you will hopefully all see from our AGM report on the company accounts, the business is now back on a sound financial footing with a healthy financial reserve. The Ravenspoint community shop is close to breaking even, which for a small independent shop in a rural community is very good indeed, and the hostel continues to be the engine that drives continued business operations, with a new online booking system leading to a large increase in visitors and a subsequent increase in income. Ravenspoint has been able to take on more staff, mostly from within the district or close by, and provide them with guaranteed minimum hours, and the cafe has been joined by new and enthusiastic volunteers, whose home baking we're sure many of you have enjoyed. The core functionality of Ravenspoint, providing important facilities to the community of South Lochs, endures.

What, then, does the future look like for the Co-Chomunn and Ravenspoint? Upon closer inspection you can see elements in place already: increased product lines are available in the shop, bringing in local butchery items and baked goods; external partnerships are being formed with companies like Piotsa, to enhance the offerings available to the community; the business' online presence has been redesigned and the operation of the hostel modernised; new faces have joined to do their part for the local community. The options to improve and develop are many, and




feedback from the market survey sent out earlier this year was very clear: residents want to see the shop open longer hours and stocking a variety of fresh produce, meat, baked goods, seafood and other locally-produced sundries; and you want to see the cafe open with full service offering a wider variety of food and drinks. These are achievable goals and would go a long way to ensuring that Ravenspoint will continue to meet the needs of the South Lochs community but the company will need your help to do this. Co-Chomunn na Pairc operates on a purely voluntary basis - Directors are not paid and have, historically and today, devoted considerable amounts of their own time to supporting the various operations of the company. The recovery from the aforementioned period of serious difficulty suffered by both the Co-Chomunn and Ravenspoint was down to the hard work of Directors who made some difficult decisions in order to preserve the greater whole of an important community asset.

Members of the community have the ideas and skills to help maintain and improve Ravenspoint and the Co-Chomunn as a legacy to the community of South Lochs which can develop and change with the needs of its residents. If any of members of the Co-Chomunn have thought of opportunities that could be grasped, aspects of the community that could be represented better, or other avenues of development that could be taken, then please enquire about joining the Board of Directors and lending your assistance to ensuring that the Co-Chomunn and Ravenspoint do right by the people of South Lochs.

#### Neolithic Axehead Returned to Pairc

A Neolithic stone axehead, found built into the wall of an old Gravir blackhouse, was returned to Pairc at 11:00am on Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> September and passed into the care of the Pairc Historical Society.

The artefact had been in the possession of Gerald Ponting in Hampshire since 1983. Gerald was given the axehead by Donald Macleod of Cromore who had helped demolish the ruins of an old blackhouse (originally built by his great-grandfather) in order to obtain stone for the reconstruction of the nearby jetty in Gravir. The axehead was found wedged into a wall of the

#### Deer Management Update

Since the start of the stag season, a total of seven stags have been culled on the Estate as part of our ongoing deer management. The hind season is scheduled to begin on 21st October, running through until 15th February and we expect cull numbers to increase accordingly.

house. He was told that 'the old people had traditions about such axeheads found in the past; building one into a house wall was supposed to bring good luck'.

The Treasure Trove Unit, to which such finds need to be reported, announced that the Crown would not be exercising its rights in this case. In the light of this, Gerald decided to present the axehead to the Ravenspoint Museum in Kershader.

Dr Alison Sheridan, retired former Principal Curator of Early Prehistory at the National Museums of Scotland, has also examined the artefact in consultation with colleagues. The hard volcanic rock from which the axehead was fashioned is not native to Lewis but perhaps a glacial erratic brought by the ice from further north. Its dark colour may reflect smoke staining from the peat fire of the blackhouse, or leaching if the axehead had lain in peat.

We will ensure that the axehead is preserved safely for the pleasure, interest, and education of future visitors as well as the community of Pairc.'

## SCF - Crofting for the Future

The Trust were delighted to host the Scottish Crofting Federation at the Resource Centre on Friday 12th & Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> September, where they ran a two-day 'Crofting for the Future' training course.

The course was aimed at both new entrant and established crofters, and held a collection of workshops related to



croft planning, habitat management, croft woodland projects, government support and grants available to crofters, and diversification opportunities available to croft businesses.

The event also saw a tour of croft 17 Lemreway, where Izzy & David gave the attendees a look at their diversified croft business, which incorporates pedigree livestock breeding, agritourism, woodland planting, and arts & crafts alongside more mainstream crofting activities.

The SCF also held their Crofting Roadshow at the Resource Centre on the evening of Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> September, which saw CEO Donna Smith meeting local crofters to discuss the SCF's work and upcoming changes to crofting legislation

and agricultural payment schemes.

Despite some weather-related challenges, the events were a success and we look forward to working further with the SCF in future.

#### 'THE GREAT AUK'S GREAT ESCAPE' -FACT AND FICTION

Illustrated Talk by Children's Author Louisa MacDougall - 5pm Friday 19<sup>th</sup> September at 'The New Lewis' Community Pub, Stornoway.

Marking a new partnership between the Islands Book Trust and 'The New Lewis', best-selling author of the popular



children's book 'The Great Auk's Great recently reprinted by the Islands Book Escape', illustrated by Joceline Hildrey, will talk about the interaction of fact and fiction in publications such as this and the issues this raises.

Her book is based on a historically documented incident involving the capture of one of the last Great Auks off St Kilda in 1821. En route from the Western Isles to Glasgow, destined to be killed and exhibited in an Edinburgh museum, the rare bird mysteriously disappeared near Arran. Despite awards for its recapture in newspapers of the day, the Great Auk was never seen again.

In her fictional story, Louisa invents a story of how the young cabin- boy Finn on the Great Auk's boat befriends 'Auky' and helps it to escape. The book also indulges in 'poetic licence' by including Joceline's wonderful drawing of the iconic Scalpay lighthouse - which was only completed in 1824.

This is an event which will appeal to both children and adults. Copies of the book,

Trust, will be available for sale.

#### SSEN Community Consultation Event

Scottish & Southern Electricity Networks held a community consultation event at the Resource Centre on Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> August between 3-7pm.

The event was a statutory preapplication consultation on the proposed new Switching Station in Balallan, which will be connected to the consented 150MW Uisenis wind farm at Eishken in order to export electricity to the national grid. The consultation included layout details, digital visualisations, and the environmental & cultural considerations taken by the project team in designing and siting the Switching Station.

The consultation saw a good turnout

from the local community, and SSEN plan to hold another consultation event at the Resource Centre in October.



The next step, the food went into the intestines to show this it was squeezed through a pair of tights. The teacher pulled out the intestines on the apron to show how long it was.


My favourite part was the flour and the fire. We had so much fun.
