

Made in Pairc Launch Event

Tuesday 11th February saw the launch of the 'Made in Pairc' initiative. Around 45 crafters, makers, growers, and skilled folk gather for a delicious meal at Ravenspoint followed by a presentation on what the initiative could offer local producers and providers of services.

One key idea from the event was the establishment of a local producer's coop, similar to REKO rings which are popular in Scandinavia, which would help build a 'Made in Pairc' brand and presence, and provide a way to market local produce within the area (and further!). This was received positively by the participants, and there was an air of excitement and opportunity during the Q&A and wider discussion.

A critical part of moving things forward will involve conducting a survey of the Pairc Estate to find what sort of goods and services are on offer here and, perhaps more importantly, what local appetites exist for the things Pairc has to offer. Several of whom stepped forward as volunteers to survey their townships, but any additional help would be welcomed.

Aline Community Woodland are delighted to have been donated a defibrillator which is now located in the cabin at the main carpark. The defibrillator was handed over recently by Heather MacRae from Eishken who was accompanied by her young nephew Tommy.

Sadly the momentum to donate these defibrillators came about through the sad and sudden death of Heather's partner John Devine. John passed away on 5th March 2024 from a heart attack due to an undiagnosed heart condition at the age of 37 and

while employed as a gamekeeper at Eishken.

The walking tracks and playpark at Aline Community Woodland are widely used by the public and while you hope never to have to use a defibrillator, having one available at the right time can be a lifesaver.
